Will – dated 13th April 1715.

Isabella Tennant, of Kilnsey, appointed her niece Anne Broadbelt as executrix. She signed with her mark indicating she was illiterate.

Her bequests were:

Brother Christopher Tennant - 18d

Brother-in-law & his wife – John Thistlewaite & Elizabeth – 5s

Cousin – George Atkinson (son of Roger) - £20 p.a. "paying yearly to his uncle James Tunstall" 5s.

Nephews – Francis & Thomas Tunstall - £10 each when they reach the age of 21

Sister – Alice Clark – 10s p.a. to be paid quarterly (at 2/6 each payment).

Total bequest - £40 5s 18d plus annuities of £20 10s

The inventory, dated 21st Jan 1715/16 was compiled by Thomas Tennant, Thomas Hall, John Thistlewaite, and Christopher Hall – it contains mostly bedroom furniture & bed linen, cash & apparel.

The will was proved at the Exchequer Court in York on Feb 10th 1715/16, signed by Anne Broadbent, Roger Mitton & John Thistlewaite.

Local Issues to note

Anything which should go into the project Timeline as of specific interest to Kilnsey's local history or which raises questions about local affairs⁵ Family tree needed for Isabella; to check PRs for her date of death.

It is possible she had already bequeathed much of her property before she drew up the will. This may explain why so little was left to her brother (unless she felt he didn't need money), and there is no mention of landed property or goods & chattels.

The contents of the inventory appears to have been confined to a single bedroom, in a house in Litton, a huge valuation of £80 being placed on a purse and apparell. This suggests she may have died not at her own home in Kilnsey, but in a relative's house, having been allocated her own room during her illness.

As a wealthy single woman what was Isabell's social standing locally? Was Anne Broadbelt also single?
